DEATH TOLL AT HAJJ PILGRIMAGE TOPS 1,300

CAIRO — More than 1,300 people died during this year's Hajj pilgrimage in Saudi Arabia as the faithful faced extreme high temperatures at Islamic holy sites in the desert kingdom, Saudi authorities announced Sunday, June 23.

Saudi Health Minister Fahd bin Abdurrahman Al-Jalajel said that 83% of the 1,301 fatalities were unauthorized pilgrims who walked long distances in soaring temperatures to perform the Hajj rituals in and around the holy city of Mecca.

The minister said 95 pilgrims were being treated in hospitals, some of whom were airlifted for treatment. He said the identification process was delayed be-

The fatalities included more than 660 Egyptians. All but 31 of them were unauthorized pilgrims, according to two officials in Cairo. Egypt has revoked the licenses of 16 travel agencies that helped unauthorized pilgrims travel to Saudi Arabia, authorities said.

The officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said most of the dead were reported at the Emergency Complex in Mecca's Al-Muaisem neighborhood. Egypt sent more than 50,000 authorized pilgrims to Saudi Arabia this

Saudi authorities cracked down on

unauthorized pilgrims, expelling tens of thousands of people. But many, mostly Egyptians, managed to reach holy sites in and around Mecca, some on foot. Unlike authorized pilgrims, they had no hotels to return to to escape the scorching

In a statement Saturday, Egypt's government said the 16 travel agencies failed to provide adequate services for pilgrims. It said these agencies illegally facilitated the travel of pilgrims to Saudi Arabia using visas that don't allow holders to travel to Mecca. The government also said officials from the companies have been referred to the public prosecutor for investigation. - AP

US northeast may get relief from heat wave

Americans from New York to Washington may finally get a reprieve on this week starting Monday, June 24, from the oppressive heat wave of the past week, although sizzling temperatures threaten much of the Southeast and Southwest, weather forecasters said.

Reports by the news agencies quoting the National Weather Service said the heat wave will likely peak in the Southwest, Mid-South and Plains early in week, with heat index readings exceeding 110 degrees Fahrenheit (43 Celsius) in some places.

Meanwhile, the Upper Midwest can expect severe thunderstorms on Monday while the Southwest may get monsoonlike conditions due to moisture coming from the remnants of

Tropical Cyclone Alberto that could produce flash flooding. Although the final day of the heat wave in the New YorkWashington corridor was forecast for Sunday, heat advisories were still in effect throughout the country.

More than 100 million people across the U.S. were under heat warnings on Sunday, June 23, when temperatures surpassed 100 degrees Fahrenheit (38 degrees Celsius) in many

Palm Springs, California, hit a high of 112 F (44 C) on Sunday while Las Vegas recorded a high of 109 F (43 C).

Death Valley, a remote part of the California desert that is 282 feet (86 meters) below sea level and often has the nation's high temperature, reached 121 F (49 C).

Climate change has fueled dangerous heat waves across the Northern Hemisphere and will continue to deliver dangerous weather for decades to come, research shows.

World leaders gather in Switzerland, Zelenskyy shows hope for peace

World leaders have gathered in the Swiss city of Burgenstock on Saturday, June 15, to discuss a peace plan for Ukraine. Volodymyr Zelenskyy, Ukraine's president, says he hopes the summit will give momentum for peace.

In a news conference with Swiss President Viola Amherd, Zelenskyy called for united international support to put pressure on Russia to end its invasion. He said," Everything that will be agreed upon at the summit today will be part of the peacemaking process that we all need."

The Swiss government says delegates from 100 countries and organizations are taking part in the two-day discussions. They include nations from what is collectively known as the Global South. China and Russia are not taking part. - NHK



WikiLeaks' Assange pleads guilty, secures freedom, ends legal fight

SAIPAN, NORTHERN MARIANA ISLANDS — WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange has pleaded guilty to a single felony charge for publishing U.S. military secrets in a deal with Justice Department prosecutors that secures his freedom and concludes a drawn-out legal saga that raised divisive questions about press freedom and national security.

The plea was entered Wednesday morning in federal court in Saipan, the capital of the Northern Mariana Islands, a U.S. commonwealth in the Pacific. He arrived at court shortly before the hearing was to begin and did not take questions.

Though the deal with prosecutors required him to admit guilt to a single felony count, it would also permit him to return to his native Australia without spending any time in an American prison. He had been jailed in the United Kingdom for the last five years, fighting extradition to the United States on an Espionage Act indictment that could have carried a lengthy prison sentence in the event of a conviction. The abrupt conclusion enables both sides to claim a degree of victory, with the Justice Department able to resolve without triaL. - AP

Ukraine begins talks to join European Union

The European Union and Ukraine began membership talks, a process that could take years and which Russia has historically tried to prevent.

The talks come a decade after Russian troops seized the Crimean Peninsula to keep Ukraine from forming relationships with the West. The accession negotiations began on Tuesday, June 25, during an intergovernmental conference held in Luxembourg. Olga Stefanishyna, deputy prime minister for European and Euro-Atlantic integration, spearheads Ukraine's delegation.- *VOA*

15 cops killed in synagogue, church attacks in Russia

MOSCOW - At least 15 police officers, several civilians, and an Orthodox priest have been killed in attacks on police posts, churches and a synagogue in Russia's North Caucasus republic of Dagestan, authorities said on Monday.

Police killed six gunmen, who attacked two Orthodox churches, a synagogue, and a police post in the cities of Derbent and the Dagestan capital, Makhachkala on Sunday, said Sergei Melikov, the governor of the Muslimdominated republic. Melikov announced three days of mourning throughout the

N. Korea sends 350 trash balloons to Seoul, Gyeonggi

SEOUL - North Korea on Tuesday, June 25, launched around 350 trashcarrying balloons toward South Korea overnight, Seoul's military said.

It was the fifth launch of its kind since last month, the military added. Some 100 balloons, mostly carrying scrap paper and waste, landed in Seoul and the northern part of Gyeonggi Province, the Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS) said in a notice to reporters.

As of 9 a.m., there were no balloons floating in the air, while an analysis of retrieved balloons showed they did not contain toxic substance, the JCS said.

Seoul's military said it is ready to carry out loudspeaker broadcasts any time and warned the implementation of such psychological warfare would depend on North Korea's action. With the latest batch, North Korea is estimated to have launched nearly 2,000 trash-carrying balloons since May 28.

RADIO MANILA, PHILIPPINE VILLAGE HISTORIC MARKER UNVEILED

LOS ANGELES – The cultural and historical significance of Radio Manila as the first 24-hour radio station dedicated to Filipino Americans in the United States was recognized with the unveiling of the historic marker at 4515 Eagle Rock Blvd., former site of the Philippine Village, on Thursday, June 13, 2024.

The historical marker was made possible through the efforts of Los Angeles City Councilmember Kevin de Leon of Council District 14, which remains the district with the largest Filipino American population, most of whom reside in Eagle Rock and the broader Northeast Los Angeles area.

Although the Philippine Village has since been torn down and Radio Manila is no longer broadcasting, Eagle Rock remains a hub of the Filipino American community in Eagle Rock.

The unveiling of the historical marker coincided with the celebration of the 126th Anniversary of the Proclamation of Philippine Independence, which made the event doubly noteworthy for its historical and cultural significance.

"Today, we honor the legacy of Radio Manila, the first 24-hour radio station in the United States dedicated to Filipino-Americans. This station right here in Eagle Rock was a beacon of hope and a vibrant voice for our community. Radio Manila was not just a radio station; it was a cultural bridge that connected Filipino-Americans to their roots providing a vital link to the language, music, the news, as well as the traditions of the Philippines," De Leon said as he extolled what Radio Manila stands for in the community.

The marker honors not only the lasting legacy of Radio Manila and the Philippine Village but also the services

and contributions of Filipino-Americans who, according to De Leon, "enrich the beautiful tapestry of our community."

Present during the unveiling of the historic marker were Dr. Oscar L. Jornacion, a recognized business leader, who established and pioneered the 1st Tri-Media Group of Companies and was the owner of Philippine Village where Radio Manila was headquartered, his wife Gilda Jornacion, former staff members and employees of Radio Manila, California Examiner/Philippine Media, friends, members of the community, and business owners who were once tenants and lessees of Philippine Village.

Dr. Jornacion, in his remarks, thanked the City of Los Angeles and Councilmember Kevin de Leon and his staff for the honor and recognition they have bestowed on Radio Manila and Philippine Village. Acknowledging the close ties between the Philippines and the United States, Dr. Jornacion said, "The Philippines and the United States have fostered a long-lasting relationship for many years. Our countries have been friends and allies for a long time. We fought wars together. The Filipinos were with you during World War 2, during the Korean War, during the Vietnam War, and we will always fight alongside the Americans."

Although Awee Abayari, the brains behind Radio Manila and its former Station Manager, was unable to attend the historic event, she sent her greetings.

"It is very emotional for me not to be able to attend today's event, but distance does not deter me from feeling the joy of the community that we served for many years and will continue to serve," she said.







She expressed her deepest gratitude to Councilmember Kevin de Leon, Alice Roth and the entire organizing community of Council District 14, and shared the recognition with the Filipino American community and supporters of Radio Manila and Philippine Village.

"This most unforgettable recognition is for the Filipino American community and the entire listening world that have supported Radio Manila and Philippine Village all these years," she added.

Radio Manila with its last broadcast in 2015 was a pioneer by itself. As the first radio station in the United States that

offered 24-hour programming dedicated to the Filipino-Americans, it provided news from the Philippines that impact the Filipino communities in the United States, played Filipino music, aired radio plays and dramas, held contests, and conducted interviews of government officials, business leaders, immigration advocates, leading personalities and celebrities both from the Philippines and the United States.

The Philippine Village, meanwhile, was home not only to Radio Manila and the 1st Tri-Media Group of Companies' newspapers (California Examiner, Phil-

ippine Media, World Reporter), and the Philippine-American Expo and Trade Shows, but also to numerous businesses, retail shops, religious organizations, a health and day care center, and was a populasr venue for many social events and celebrations.

In closing, De Leon said, "Although Radio Manila is no longer broadcasting and the Philippine Village that once stood right here has been torn down, the spirit from what's inside the heart still lives on today. They laid the foundation for what Eagle Rock is today, a hub of Filipino-American culture."- EMWagner

World Vision highlights race against time in Papua New Guinea, saying humanitarian support crucial for landslide recovery

PORT MORESBY (May 28, 2024) — Global humanitarian organization World Vision is responding to the devastating landslide in Papua New Guinea that is feared to have killed as many as 2,000 people and has left thousands more without basic necessities and at risk of further danger. Joint assessments conducted by government disaster management authorities, U.N. agencies and humanitarian agencies like World Vision reveal that May 24 disaster has impacted nearly 7,900 people and completely destroyed Tulipari village.

Early reports from the United Nations estimated 670 fatalities; however, that number is expected to rise. Papua New Guinea government officials have estimated that over 2,000 people were buried by debris. The true scale of the disaster remains unclear due to limited communication and the ongoing search efforts.

UP Manila develops potent herbal solution vs. fungal skin infections

MANILA – The University of the Philippines Manila's National Integrated Research Program on Medicinal Plants (NIRPROMP) has created an herbal lotion against skin fungal infections using the Akapulco plant, a perennial shrub widely distributed in the Philippines.

Skin infections are prevalent among Filipinos due to environmental factors, such as heat and humidity, and socioeconomic conditions, such as overcrowding, poverty, and poor hygiene.

Institute of Herbal Medicine - National Institutes of Health (IHM-NIH) Director Dr. Cecilia Maramba-Lazarte noted that Azole antifungals treat such

infections effectively but are often expensive and require prolonged application.

"Traditional healers and those of other cultures have used Akapulco (scientific name: Senna alata) to treat skin diseases. The antifungal activity of Akapulco has been well-documented in various studies."

It contains several phytochemicals, including chrysophanic acid and anthraquinones, which exhibit strong antifungal activity against Epidermophyton, Microsporum, Trichophyton, and Penicillium.

Lazarte said the effectiveness of Akapulco preparations had been measured by the results of seven random-

PH needs support from int'l community to resolve dispute with China – UP prof

MANILA - The Philippines needs the support of the international community amid the brewing tension between the country and China in the West Philippine Sea (WPS)

This was the assessment made by professor and lawyer Jay Batongbacal from the University of the Philippines (UP) during a news forum in Quezon City on Saturday, June 22.

He said China's latest provocative actions which injured one Philippine Navy personnel must be noted. China must be held accountable "for having caused this damage, for essentially attacking the vessel with those knives in order to disable

But the professor opined the dispute between the Philippines and China can still be resolved.

The important thing, he said, is for the Philippines to show where the country stands. He said the Philippines is still open for peaceful negotiations. He also said the Mutual Defense Treaty (MDT) and the Enhanced Defense Cooperation Agreement (EDCA) are still very much in effect.

Meanwhile, Batongbacal shared the rules and jurisprudence in international law related to the Ayungin Shoal incident marred by Chinese provocations

"There are rules and jurisprudence on this issue particularly in International Humanitarian Law and the laws of armed conflict. And in those rules or laws, incidents such as skirmishes, isolated skirmishes, geographically-isolated skirmishes may be considered as what legally might be classified as 'frontier incidents," said Atty. Batongbacal.

Discussions on deterring malicious cyber activity and the UN framework of responsible state behavior in cyberspace

On June 13 and 14, 2024, the United States Department of State hosted 22 countries and the European Union for discussions focused on efforts to deter malicious cyber activity and coordinate international responses, led by Liesyl Franz, Deputy Assistant Secretary for the Cyberspace and Digital Policy Bureau's Office of International Cyberspace Security.

Representatives from Australia, Belgium, Canada, Czechia, Denmark, Estonia, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, Republic of Korea, Singapore, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, and the European Union exchanged views and national experiences.

Participants recognized that every country faces different circumstances. They noted the growing cyber challenges in the Indo-Pacific region, the growing global ransomware threat, the war in Ukraine, and malicious cyber activity designed to destabilize and undermine democratic processes and societies. Nearly half the people of the world are going to be going to the polls in 2024. Representatives considered foreign policy approaches to current and emerging threats of concern in cyberspace and building resilience against those that transgress the norms of responsible state behavior in cyberspace using all

ISTANBUL - Chinese tech giant ByteDance is mulling over laying off 450 employees in Indonesia as part of its restructuring efforts following the merger of its e-commerce unit, TikTok Shop, with the Indonesian e-commerce company

The layoffs account for 9 percent of ByteDance's workforce in the country, the Jakarta Globe reported

Nuraini Razak, Tokopedia's director of corporate affairs, corroborated that the layoffs stem from the merger.

"We had to make necessary adjustments to the organizational structure as part of the company's strategy to continue growing," Nuraini was cited as saying in an official statement. - Anadolu

JAPAN, INDIA PLEDGE DEEPER COOPERATION

Japan's Prime Minister Kishida Fumio and India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi have agreed to deepen bilateral cooperation with an eye on an upcoming visit by the Indian leader to Japan.

Kishida and Modi recently met on the sidelines of the Group of Seven summit in Italy.

Kishida noted that the Japan-India Special Strategic and Global Partnership is in its 10th year. He said looking ahead to the next 10 years, he hopes that bilateral relations will deepen and become more diversified. - NHK World

UN food agency warns of 'catastrophic levels of hunger' in southern Gaza

The United Nations' food agency has called for an immediate ceasefire in the conflict in Gaza, saying that catastrophic levels of hunger may develop soon in the southern part of the territory.

The humanitarian situation in Gaza is deteriorating as fierce fighting between Israeli forces and Hamas continues, while negotiations for a ceasefire and the release of hostages are making slow

On June 15 a local Palestinian media outlet cited medical sources saying that 19 people were killed in an attack on homes in northern Gaza. Gaza health authorities said on Friday that 37,266 people have died since the conflict began in October last year.

World Food Programme Deputy Executive Director Carl Skau spoke at the end of his mission to Gaza. He said people there told him that they need sanitation, basic health care and some level of dignity, and that everyone he spoke to wants a ceasefire.

He said escalating fighting in some parts of Gaza, including Rafah in the south, makes it nearly impossible for humanitarian operations to deliver desperately needed food aid. He also mentioned the fear of extreme hunger.- NHK

UN: World losing 4 football fields worth of healthy land per second

ANKARA - The world is losing almost four football fields worth of healthy land every second due to degradation from desertification, data by the United Nations suggest.

At this rate, over 100 million hectares of healthy land are lost annually, according to data compiled by Anadolu ahead of June 17, marked as World Day to Combat Desertification and Drought

UN data reveals that since 1900, droughts have killed at least 11 million people while affecting over 2 billion

The World Day to Combat Desertification and Drought aims to raise public



awareness about desertification, land degradation and drought.

This year the day will be marked with the theme, "United for Land: Our Legacy. Our Future." It aims to mobilize all segments of society to support sustainable land stewardship. - Anadolu

KING AND QUEEN OF THE NETHERLANDS PAY WORKING VISIT TO UNITED STATES

His Majesty King Willem-Alexander and Her Majesty Queen Máxima recently travel led to the United States for a working visit to the states of Georgia and New York. The visit will took place from Monday, June 10 to June 13, 2024. In Georgia the King and Queen visited Atlanta and Savannah, and in New York they visited Albany and New York City.

The King and Queen were accompanied by the Minister of Infrastructure and Water Management, Mark Harbers. In New York State they were joined by the Minister for Foreign Trade and Development Cooperation, Liesje Schreinemacher.

Filipino victims of labor exploitation in Brussels repatriated

BRUSSELS - Five Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) who were victims of labor exploitation were repatriated on 12 June 2024. Two others were repatriated on 27 May 2024. The OFWs were recruited by an employer based in Poland, and subcontracted to Belgian companies. Flemish labor inspectors found that the Filipinos had been provided spurious contracts and work permits, and were living in poor conditions.

Through the assistance and support of the DFA Office of the Undersecretary for Migration Affairs, the Philippine Honorary Consulate in Flanders, the Migrant Workers Office in Berlin (MWO-Berlin), and the International Organization for Migration (IOM), the Filipinos were repatriated and given support to restart their lives. OFWs in Europe are encouraged to take steps to avoid being victimized by unscrupulous employers, such as by ensuring that their work contracts and A1 permits or residence IDs are valid.

US Aid and HCM's Department of Industry and Trade celebrate advances in renewable energy and energy efficiency

HO CHI MINH CITY -- On May 20th, the United States Mission to Vietnam, through the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), and the Ho Chi Minh City (HCMC) Department of Industry and Trade (DOIT), celebrated their joint success in a five-year partnership advancing renewable energy and energy efficiency in HCMC.




Planning and Shopping Tips

Calorie restriction builds strong muscle, stimulates healthy aging genes

Reducing overall calorie intake may rejuvenate your muscles and activate biological pathways important for good health, according to researchers at the National Institutes of Health and their colleagues. Decreasing calories without depriving the body of essential vitamins and minerals, known as calorie restriction, has long been known to delay the progression of agerelated diseases in animal models. This new study, published in Aging Cell, suggests the same biological mechanisms may also apply to humans.

Researchers analyzed data from participants in the Comprehensive Assessment of Long-Term Effects of Reducing Intake of Energy (CALERIE), a study supported by the National Institute on Aging (NIA) that examined whether moderate calorie restriction conveys the same health benefits seen in animal studies. They found that during a two-year span, the goal for participants was to reduce their daily caloric intake by 25%, but the highest the group was able to reach was a 12% reduction.

"A 12% reduction in calorie intake is very modest," said corresponding author and NIA Scientific Director Luigi Ferrucci. M.D.. Ph.D. "This kind of small reduction in calorie intake is doable and may make a big difference in your health."

Staying safe during extreme heat

Heat related illnesses and deaths are largely preventable with proper planning and action. There are preventative actions that people can take before heat events occur, as well as actions to take while experiencing heat:

- During times of high temperatures, stay indoors in areas with access to air conditioning. If you do not have access to air conditioning in your home, locate an open cooling center in your area, ex. your local mall, library, church, or other space.
- Make sure to hydrate with water throughout the day, and avoid sugary beverages or drinks with caffeine.
 - Take cool showers or baths.
 - Do not rely on a fan as your primary cooling device.
- Avoid strenuous activities that can result in overexposure to the sun.
- If you are outdoors, make sure to wear light-colored clothing, a hat, sunglasses, and sunscreen.
 - Never leave people or pets in a vehicle.
- Check on family, friends, and neighbors who do not have air conditioning and who spend much of their time alone.

What are the signs of heat related illness?

Heat-related illnesses happen when a person's body temperature rises faster than it can cool itself down. This can cause damage to the brain and other vital organs. Types of heat related illnesses include:

- Heat Cramps Muscular pains and spasms due to heavy exertion. They are often the first signal that the body is having trouble with the heat.
- Heat Exhaustion Typically occurs when people exercise heavily or work in a hot, humid place where body fluids are lost through heavy sweating. Blood flow to the skin increases, causing blood flow to decrease to the vital organs. This results in a form of mild shock.
- Heat Stroke A life-threatening condition. The victim's temperature control system, which produces sweating to cool the body, stops working. The body temperature can rise so high that brain damage and death may result if the body is not cooled quickly. A person who is experiencing heat stroke needs medical attention. heat.gov

HOW TO AVOID A SCAM

Four Signs That It's a Scam

- 1. Scammers PRETEND to be from an organization you know. Scammers often pretend to be contacting you on behalf of the government, a business, like a utility company, a tech company, or a charity asking for donations.
- 2. Scammers say there's a PROB-LEM or a PRIZE. They might say you're in trouble with the government. Or someone in your family had an emergency. Others will say you won money in a or sweepstakes but have to pay a fee to get it.
- 3. Scammers PRESSURE you to act immediately. They might threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your driver's or business license, or deport you.
- Scammers tell you to PAY in a specific way. They often insist that you can only pay by using cryptocurrency, wiring money through a company like

MoneyGram or Western Union, using a payment app, or putting money on a gift card and then giving them the numbers on the back of the card.

Some will send you a check (that will later turn out to be fake), then tell you to deposit it and send them money.

How To Avoid a Scam

Block unwanted calls and text messages.

Don't give your personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect.

Resist the pressure to act immediately.

Never pay someone who insists that you can only pay with cryptocurrency, a wire transfer, a payment app, or a gift card. And never deposit a check and send money back to someone.

Before you do anything else, stop and talk to someone you trust.

Health Update

By DR. ZHAOPING LI Director of UCLA Center for Human Nutrition

Q: Can relying on TikTok trends for nutritional advice be harmful? If so, what should people look out for?

Dr. Li: Absolutely. Nutrition advice needs to be scientifically based and should come from those who have been formally trained in the field. The foods we eat play an important role in disease prevention and treatment, so it should be considered medicine.

People – especially parents and teens – should seek advice from physicians, health care providers, and those trained in nutrition, such as registered dieticians. They can also get information from the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and websites of major academic medical centers.

Q: Take the "oatzempic" example circulating social media today. Is there any scientific evidence supporting the effectiveness of oats and lime juice for weight loss?

Dr. Li: No, but by coining a name that sounds like Ozempic, I can see why people might be easily fooled into thinking it may be based on science or work like Ozempic. If oats and lime juice are used as meal substitutes, it may support weight loss efforts, but the weight loss would be due to a calorie deficit.

Oats and oatmeal are nutritious and should be considered part of a healthy diet. They have been proven to help reduce cholesterol and blood pressure. Fiber in oatmeal can also impact hormones that regulate hunger and appetite and help one feel full for longer. Lime juice is a source of vitamin C. But depending on this concoction for dramatic weight loss is foolhardy and could be especially harmful to those with underlying health conditions or the elderly.

Team Philippines to Paris, Tolentino said, would breach the 20-athlete mark with more qualifiers expected in athletics, golf and swimming—the sport's international federations will announce the official qualifiers for the Olympics this week.

MANILA - The Philippines will host the inaugural FIFA Futsal Women's World Cup next year.

Philippine Football Federation (PFF) president John Gutierrez made the announcement during a press conference at Citadines Bay City in Pasay City recently. He was joined by FIFA director for tournaments Jaime Yarza, FIFA head of Olympics, Futsal and Beach Soccer Kasra Haghighi and futsal manager Laura Cusco.

The Philippines was selected among six bidders that included Brazil, Spain and Italy.

The schedule of the tournament is yet to be finalized.

The format will have 16 teams to be drawn into four groups. The top two teams in each group will advance to the knockout phase and eventually to the quarterfinals, semifinals, playoff for third place and final match.

The Philippines is already qualified as host and will join three teams from Asia. The other qualifiers will come from Africa (1), Central, North America and Carribean (2), South America (3), Oceania (1) and Europe (4).- PNA

Sofia to host 20th World Meeting of Bulgarian Media in May 2025

ISMAIL, Ukraine - Sofia will host the 20th World Meeting of Bulgarian Media on May 24, 2025, Bulgarian News Agency (BTA) Director General Kiril Valchev announced at the closing of the 19th edition in Ukraine held on June 18-21.

The BTA set the 20th World Meeting on May 24 which is the Day of the Holy Brothers Cyril and Methodius, of the Bulgarian Alphabet, Education and Culture, and of Slavic Literature in Bulgaria.

BTA has had five strategic goals in recent years and BTA has organized meetings dedicated to four of them, Valchev said.

The 2018 meeting in Skopje has a theme "Media and Memory", the 2021 meeting in Bulgaria's Rila monastery and

Kyustendil was about "Media and the Truth", the 2022 meeting in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv was about "Media and Salvation", the 2023 meeting in the Bulgarian town of Kazanlak was about "Media and Freedom".

"The fifth, and probably the major goal of the media, is knowledge," he said, referring to the motto of the next meeting. The last meeting's theme was "Media and Community".

Valchev said the point of these meetings is for the Bulgarian media to help preserve the Bulgarian community. He said there should be a permanent narrative about Bulgarians abroad, which should be directed to them by the Bulgarian media around the world and the media in Bulgaria.

Organized by BTA, the 19th World Meeting of Bulgarian Media was held in Ode-Bolhrad, and Izmail, Ukraine on June 21.
